Pastor's Report, May 2024

My sermons for the past few weeks have been about the widespread misinterpretation of the Bible. Last week I told how in Mississippi, groups of Christians have raised millions of dollars to erect 14 giant crosses — 120 feet high and 64 feet wide. Though Mississippi is the poorest state in America, much of the funds to pay for these crosses have been raised from poor parishioners. What are these people being told? That Jesus wants them to build giant crosses? Who is interpreting the Bible to these congregations? And isn't there anybody saying, "What??!! That's a crazy idea!! Build crosses at a quarter of a million each in the poorest state? How about low-income housing or homeless shelters or food banks? But giant, monstrosity crosses?" There's nothing in the gospels or epistles or anywhere else in the Bible that says God wants us to build giant crosses. Why do people listen to "leaders" who make such crazy interpretations of scripture?

We would be better off to go to the Bible and read it ourselves — especially the gospels. And look at what Jesus did. And read his parables again — The Good Samaritan, The Prodigal Son, The Two Brothers. "Christians" doing crazy, wasteful, hideous things like building 120 foot crosses are giving our religion, Christianity, a bad reputation. OUR RELIGION IS SUPPOSED TO CHANGE US --NOT THE LANDSCAPE!!!!!

On April 14th I preached about a preacher in Tennessee, Greg Locke, of the Global Vision Bible Church, who shouted and screamed at his congregation (he's on YouTube and other places) "If any of you are Democrats, get out of here! You're not welcome—you demons! You can't be democrat and Christian!!!" Great. I went back to my Bible and reread the gospels just to make sure I wasn't missing something. Did Jesus say that? Did Jesus not like Democrats? Did he not like anybody? Did Jesus ever tell anyone in his crowds to leave? It's not in Luke — not in the other gospels either. This preacher is making stuff up. If he'd read his Bible, he'd see that Jesus loves Democrats and Republicans — and Nazis and atheists and Canaanites and the centurions pounding nails into him. Pastor Locke is misinforming thousands of people in his megachurch — and his congregation is yelling "Amen!" to his lies.

But we are responsible for what we believe. The problem with the Bible is it's a difficult book to understand. It's thousands of years old, and it comes from a culture that is foreign to us. So what do we do with it? What do we do when we read that verse where Jesus tells us to hate our parents? In another verse he commands us to love each other. But he also called a Canaanite woman a dog -- that doesn't sound loving. And yet he praised her great faith and cured her daughter. In the gospels we find more contradictions than clarity—how do we make sense of it? And did Jesus really walk on water or was that story a fable about faith and trust? And if we don't believe he really walked on water, does that make us bad Christians? And will we go to hell if we don't believe that Jesus really — literally — multiplied a few loaves to feed five thousand people?

Or does our religion all come down to how we treat one another? Because, according to Jesus, we were not put here on this earth to be judges of each other but practitioners of our faith. Love one another Jesus said. He didn't say "You must believe I walked on the sea of Galilee." He didn't say, "You must say I am lord and savior." He didn't say, "You must habitually correct and judge your neighbor." But he did say: "Love one another." Who is that? I suppose it's all of us—republican, democrat, people who erect hideous crosses and people who complain about people building crosses. Love one another. Three words. For something so contentious and misunderstood, our faith is -- simple. So in the words of Bob Marley and Jesus Christ, and remembering our dear friend Phyllis,

Don't worry, about tomorrow, every little thing's going to be alright,
